SAINT NICHOLAS IS COMING TO TOWN

Saint Nicholas' Day falls on December 6. on the eve of St. Nicholas' Day, children leave a boot near the window or the front door. The bigger the boots, the better the presents. More can fit. In other countries, like the Netherlands or Belgium, children in their shoes leave a carrot or hay for Saint Nicholas' horse. The carrot or hay should help the horse during its journey to



deliver presents. What a lovely idea! In the Czech Republic and Slovakia, Saint Nicholas travels with an angel and a devil. They help him decide if a child's behavior was good or bad. In Bari, Italy, there is a local tradition in which unmarried women would visit the Basilica and circle a specific "miraculous" column in the crypt three times to help them find a husband. I am not sure how that works. In USA and UK, Saint Nicholas' Day is celebrated in some communities, similarly to our tradition, by leaving a shoe or stocking out on the evening of December 5th to find it filled with small gifts the next morning.
